Community Foundations in Your City: A New Paradigm

Over the last three decades the Lilly Endowment has nurtured the birth and growth of Community Foundations in all 92 counties in the State of Indiana through the GIFT (Giving Indiana Funds for Tomorrow) Initiative. Still, many Community Foundations are recognized only as grantmakers. Grantmaking is just one of the roles a Community Foundation plays in their community. The Endowment recognizes the potential in each community for the Community Foundations to be leading partners in that local civic space that guide strategic and comprehensive investments in both people and place that are critical to the future vibrancy of Indiana neighborhoods, towns, cities, and counties. **This is a big paradigm shift for many communities and their Foundations.** The GIFT Technical Assistance Program of the Indiana Philanthropy Alliance is tasked with helping manage this shift. Terri Johnson, Associate Director of the GIFT Program, will give a presentation about the history of this development, what this particular program will do, and the opportunities that mayors may develop in enhanced strategic partnerships in community economic development.

Utility Asset Management Planning and Successful Implementation

Much of the existing utility system assets have reached the end or are nearing the end of their useful lives. Utilities across the country are facing the need to replace hundreds of millions of dollars of infrastructure assets in the coming decades. The SRF loan program which funds utility projects with low interest loans across the state of Indiana recognizes the importance of Asset Management Plans (AMP) and have implemented new requirements for those utilities participating in the loan programs. Presenters will discuss the importance of having a long-term funding strategy to help keep user rates affordable and best practices in developing funding plans.

Case Study for Community Engagement: Nickel Plate Trail

When the Cities of Fishers and Noblesville and Hamilton County announced their intent to convert 9 miles of track to a trail, it presented an opportunity to engage the community in what they wanted to see along Fishers' section. From student projects to public meetings, to a "feedback weekend" driven by fun events and interactive conversations, the outreach efforts drummed up over 1,500 ideas for the trail design. The result: a community-designed, world-class amenity for all.

Deployment of 5G Technology in Your Community

Recycling is Broken: Changes in the Collection and Handling

Municipal recycling programs have been one of the great success stories as the overall recycling rate has tripled in the past 30 years. More than half of Americans have access to local curbside recycling. The current economic model for recycling is unsustainable as the “China Sword” import restrictions has halted U.S. exports of recycling material to China. In addition, evolving mix of materials in the recycling stream, shifts in the end-market demands and limited public awareness about what and how to recycle. Can we save recycling? This workshop will explore the options.

Offsetting the Public Impact of Development: Development Exactions and Impact Fees

This workshop will cover the basics of development impact fees and exactions, including statutory requirements, and federal and state court precedent setting guidelines (and limits) on a local unit’s ability to levy the same. While legal case law will be the foundation for some of the workshop, the presenters will spend time discussing actual case facts and real scenarios, further illustrating items for consideration the next time a local unit wishes to require a developer impact fee or exaction.
