FDA AND CDC EXPAND USE OF PFIZER VACCINE

On Jan. 3, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration amended the <u>Emergency Use Authorization</u> for the Pfizer vaccine to:

- Expand booster eligibility to include individuals 12 through 15 years of age.
- Reduce the time between Pfizer's primary series and a booster dose to at least 5 months.
- Allow for a third primary series dose for certain immunocompromised children 5 through 11 years of age.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) <u>updated its</u> <u>recommendations</u> to include the first two authorizations on Jan. 4. On Jan. 5, the Advisory Commission on Immunization Practices (ACIP) and CDC <u>endorsed</u> the expansion of booster eligibility to include children age 12 to 15.

Please note that boosters for individuals age 12 to 15 are authorized and strongly recommended.

UPDATED GUIDANCE

The CDC recently <u>updated its guidance</u> for quarantine and isolation. Consider this quarantine option if you need a little extra incentive to make the decision to get vaccinated:

 If you are a close contact of someone with COVID-19, you do not need to quarantine if you have received all of the vaccination doses you are eligible to receive. You should wear a mask around others for 10 days after the exposure.

Please note that close contacts should get tested five days after contact. If you test positive or develop COVID-19 symptoms, isolate from other people and follow other <u>isolation recommendations</u>.

COVID-19 Booster Doses

The best way to protect yourself from COVID-19, including Omicron is to get vaccinated and boosted.



Everyone ages 12 and older should get a booster.



At least 5 months after your second Pfizer shot, 5 months after your second Moderna shot, or 2 months after Johnson & Johnson.



FDA AND CDC SHORTEN INTERVAL FOR MODERNA BOOSTER

On Jan. 7, the FDA <u>amended the EUA</u> for the Moderna COVID-19 Vaccine to shorten the time between the completion of a primary series and a booster dose to at least 5 months for individuals 18 and older. CDC <u>authorized</u> the shortened interval the same day.

- Report any adverse effects from any vaccine to the <u>Vaccine Adverse Effect Reporting System (VAERS)</u>.



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




Total Individuals Fully Vaccinated*

Here are the latest percentages of people who are fully vaccinated by age group. These percentages include residents and staff in long-term care facilities.

J&J VACCINE NEWS

Last month, the CDC endorsed the recommendation of its advisory committee for individuals to receive an mRNA vaccine (Pfizer or Moderna) over Johnson & Johnson (J&J).

<u>This recommendation</u> is based on a rare adverse side effect among other concerns. The Indiana Department of Health (IDOH) no longer offers J&J at its clinics. **REMEMBER**: Getting any vaccination is better than not being vaccinated at all. Individuals should discuss the risks and benefits with a healthcare professional.
