WORKSHOPS

Residential TIF: A Tool to Help Your Community Grow

For years, the logic was that traditional TIF and other economic development tools would create jobs and wages, and then residential growth would soon follow. However, many communities experienced a disconnect, with a strong ability to attract employees but struggles to attract residents to their cities and towns. Many potential new housing developments stalled due to developer financing gaps and infrastructure needs. The state legislature created residential TIF as a tool to help combat those barriers to development. The overall mechanics, calculations, and process work similar to traditional TIF but with a few nuances. Once established, residential TIF can be a valuable revenue stream to push potential housing developments across the finish line. Residential TIF is a tool to grow your future tax base, as well as keep families and their incomes in your community to further spur your local economy.

Creating a Sense of Community Through Your Park Department

The municipal parks and recreation department is at the forefront in your community, building connections and shaping attitudes. Additionally, many towns are starting to see the economic benefits of parks and recreation departments. This session will highlight the NW Indiana One Region Parknership Program that brings together park departments from Lake, LaPorte, and Porter Counties to improve the visibility, importance, and awareness of parks and recreation.

Combating Inflation: Delivering Capital Projects on Budget

In a post pandemic world, supply chain disruptions and run-away inflation has resulted in municipal project costs ballooning to all time highs. Taking a project back to the drawing board due to astronomical bid results is becoming the norm rather than the exception. How can we structure our project timelines in a way that takes us from the proverbial "Point A to Point B" with little to no expensive delays or sidesteps? In this presentation, our diverse panel of municipal project professionals will dive into the various project procurement methods and the pros and cons in connection therewith. By the end, attendees should be armed with valuable insight on their options and be able to make informed project decisions on behalf of their constituents.

Large Impacts in Small and Rural Communities: Monumental Effects of Abandoned Property Redevelopment

Successful land reuse in small and rural communities often looks very different than in larger communities. For many smaller and rural communities it can be difficult to see past brownfield site challenges. Successful brownfield redevelopment in small and rural communities often makes a monumental impact if done right. In this session, we will discuss how to navigate the challenges of bringing resources to areas that sometimes lack the capacity to fully handle brownfield redevelopment, how to compete with larger communities for assistance and resources, and how to build a vision that fits the budget and needs of a small and rural Indiana, maximizing their chance to realize site redevelopment goals that still make a big, positive enhancement to community character.

What is Community Paramedicine and How is it Deployed?

Community paramedicine brings supportive resources to the homes of your citizens with non-emergent needs. This workshop will give attendees a look at the City of Monticello's paramedicine program to learn how this personal touch is helping some of the city's most vulnerable community members reach the services they need and also reducing hospital readmittance. Monticello's partnership with IU Health White Memorial Hospital makes the program possible and could act as model that could be replicated in your town or city.
