During this day and a half program guest speakers and Aim staff will present an agenda of highly substantive sessions that will lead mayors through unique leadership and problem-solving exercises with their colleagues from across the state. Featuring many opportunities for the sharing of innovative, effective strategies to run city government, Mayors Institute sessions are timely, relevant, and essential.

Aim and Ball State will host Mayors Institute, October 2-3, in Indianapolis. All Hoosier mayors are invited to participate in the Mayors Institute to achieve certification in this exciting city leadership program.

Participation and Recognition in City Leadership

All Indiana mayors are strongly encouraged to attend at least two Mayors Institute sessions each year. Aim and ICI will award mayors a Certificate of Achievement in three levels. Achievement will be measured by participation and attendance at the Mayors Institute sessions. Additionally, mayors that have reached Indiana City Leadership Ambassador status are eligible for an advanced level: Indiana City Leadership Executive. OCTOBER WORKSHOPS

Comprehensive Community Wealth Approach Synergies with Measuring Return on Quality of Life Projects

ROI on Quality of Life Projects? While the research is clearer every day on the importance of quality of life investments in our communities, elected officials face the challenge of demonstrating fiscal prudence to their residents. When traditional ROI doesn't quite fit the bill, how can we measure and communicate the impacts projects have on our communities? David Terrell and Mike Hicks talk through the Comprehensive Community Wealth Approach as a way to have these conversations.

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Examining Uses of Tax Increment Finance

Sometimes there is a fine line between can it be done and should it be done. In the government space, leaders sometimes need to dig deeper and think more strategically about how to navigate allowable uses of revenue streams to avoid confusion and unnecessary time and expense. This is increasingly important when considering how best to utilize revenues from TIF. Participants will get a detailed overview of allowable uses and where certain expenditures could jeopardize the future of this valuable incentive.

Lunch and Legislative Discussion

This roundtable discussion, facilitated by Aim CEO Matt Greller and Government Affairs Director Jenna Bentley, will focus on the 2024 legislative session. The team will review news from various task forces and study committees, discuss feedback from a pre-event questionnaire regarding potential city-focused legislative initiatives, and field your questions and concerns.

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Mayors Idea Exchange

This Mayors Idea Exchange is an inspiring overview of a program born in Evansville and later adopted by the city of Princeton. Cops Connecting with Kids provides an avenue for law enforcement officers in their respective communities to build relationships with officers while giving them the magic of experiencing Walt Disney World.

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Tourism: A Major Spark Plug to your Municipality's Economic Engine

One of the primary objectives of tourism is to promote economic development by generating income and employment opportunities for local residents and businesses. When visitors come to your community's destinations, they spend money on good and services, which contribute to your local econ-

omy and tax collection. Learn how tourism in your community contributes to your quality of life and supports municipal services.

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Building Partnerships as a Method for Preserving Historic Properties and Reducing Blight

Preserving historic structures, when possible, helps maintain quality of place and allows communities to distinguish themselves from one another. Choosing preservation can sometimes be a daunting task but building key partnerships can pave the way to incredible results. This discussion will cover the benefits of preservation as a means of reducing or eliminating blight.

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The Lilly Endowment's College and Community Collaboration Initiative

Earlier this year, Lilly Endowment, Inc. launched their College and Community Collaboration initiative. This program offers Indiana-based universities and colleges to apply for grants to help them plan and implement projects with their community partners, designed to enhance the quality of life and place of their surroundings. Participants will learn more about this program and how it has been embraced by Huntington University, the City of Huntington, Huntington County, Northeast Indiana Regional Partnership, and other stakeholders. Speakers will review how their collaboration produced plans they hope will garner up to \$25 million for implementation from the Endowment.

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Housing & Community Regeneration

University of Notre Dame School of Architecture's new initiative on Housing and Community Regeneration provides assistance to municipalities and non-profit institutions in Rust Belt cities in the form of design studies and research relating to economic development and the improvement of the built environment. The work of this 'Think and Do Tank" seeks to offer concrete solutions that address critical issues of our time by creating human-scale walkable communities; activating abandoned, vacant, and underutilized properties; providing housing solutions; addressing inequities resulting from a legacy of housing and transportation policy; and mitigating the impact of climate change through sustainable development patterns of growth. This presentation will share recent work conducted as part of this initiative as well as seeking to facilitate a discussion with members of the Mayor's Institute regarding needs of communities throughout the State of Indiana.
