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

Also, up for discussion will be the allocation of expenditure rates across different counties and the rationale behind these decisions. This workshop will pro- vide valuable perspectives and help you develop strategic talking points for engaging with legislators and municipal representatives on these critical issues. As TIF allocation areas sunset in accordance with Indiana law, the incremental assessed value is no longer captured by a unit's redevelopment commission and becomes avail- able for general taxation by overlapping units with property tax levies. When assessed value is released in this way, it creates downward pressure on tax rates. Tax rate changes are based upon changes in the property tax levy relative to changes in the units taxable assessed value. For taxing units that are at their maximum levy, no additional tax revenue is generated from assessed value growth (except cumula- tive funds and circuit breaker change). Challenges can arise when large amounts of assessed value are added back to the tax rolls due to sunsetting allocation areas. Many munic- ipalities are quickly facing TIF sunsets and should plan now

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PLACEMAKING AWARDS

The Placemaking Award highlights programs or projects that have been implemented and demonstrate new approaches for solving municipal challenges. Placemaking projects also exemplify the positive impact of planning, regeneration, or economic development work on the physical quality of a place, as well as the economic and social well-being of a community. Nominations must have a physical aspect. Awards are presented in multiple population categories based on nominations received.

Town of Remington **Downtown Revitalization**

Over the past decade, the Town of Remington has undergone a significant transformation to revitalize its downtown area. Once marked by boarded-up windows, unwalkable sidewalks, and safety concerns, the town embarked on a comprehensive effort to renovate the streetscape, restore the Train Depot, and create a new Town Hall. These projects, funded in part by a Downtown Master Planning Grant, were completed in 2023, bringing new life and energy to the community's heart. Today, Remington's downtown boasts improved navigation, enhanced pedestrian access, and inviting spaces for community events. The revitalization has sparked a resurgence in local activities, including the return of the Farmer's Market after a decade-long hiatus. The newly renovated Town Hall, donated by the Regions Corporation, now complements the updated downtown, making Remington a vibrant and welcoming space that reflects the spirit and resilience of its community.







City of Greensburg **Building Bridges Inclusive Park**


Greensburg's Building Bridges Inclusion Park was inspired by Police Chief Brendan Bridges after his son Jaxon, who is autistic and nonverbal, experienced the benefits of an inclusive playground in Ohio. Recognizing the need for a similar space in Greensburg, the community rallied to create a park where children of all abilities can play together, fostering social and cognitive skills in a safe environment. The park, completed three years ahead of schedule thanks to \$800,000 raised through crowdfunding, private donations, and local government support, opened in fall 2023. Designed for children aged two to fourteen, it serves as both a playground and a symbol of the community's commitment to inclusivity, raising awareness of disabilities and inspiring the creation of more welcoming spaces.



City of Franklin **Young's Creek Park & Amphitheater**


On June 7, 2008, a historic flood devastated Franklin's downtown, leaving the community struggling and businesses shuttered. In response, the city collaborated with local businesses and residents to envision a brighter future, leading to the creation of Youngs Creek Park to be a space designed to manage floodwaters while serving as a vibrant community hub.

Opened in 2022, Youngs Creek Park features an amphitheater, splashpad, playground, and trails, all shaped by community input. The park has become the heart of social activity in Franklin, hosting events, festivals, and more. The park's innovative design, including flood resilience features and a new pedestrian bridge connecting neighborhoods, symbolizes Franklin's journey from tragedy to triumph.



City of Indianapolis **SPARK on the Circle**

Launched in 2023 as part of the city of Indianapolis' Downtown Resiliency Strategy, SPARK on the Circle has quickly become a popular destination, attracting over 78,000 visitors with nearly 250 unique events in its first season. This park-like space on Monument Circle, created by Downtown Indy, Inc., Big Car Collaborative, and the Indianapolis Department of Metropolitan Development, was designed to offer a safe, active, and engaging environment for all. SPARK features green spaces for play, relaxation, social connection, and performance, with contemporary seating, vending services, and free weekly programming. By temporarily closing parts of Monument Circle to traffic, the city transformed it into a vibrant public space, reinvigorating the area and inviting residents and visitors to experience this iconic landmark in a new and dynamic way.





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PROGRAM INNOVATION AWARDS

The Program Innovation Award honors communities that introduced and executed new ideas and methods to carry out municipal activities. Awards are presented in multiple population categories based on nominations received.

City of Union City **Vision Corner Learning Center**

The Vision Corner Learning Center in downtown Union City opened in April 2024 and is the result of a collaboration between the local school corporation and city leadership. Transforming a former blighted building into a beacon of innovation, Vision Corner is designed to boost economic development by providing career-focused education. It offers students hands-on experiences in various fields, including business, healthcare, and media, while showcasing the opportunities available within their hometown. Key features include a student-run enterprise, KISS Communications studio, and a pioneering esports program. The center also hosts a medical pathways curriculum in collaboration with Ivy Tech and Reid Health, addressing the area's need for healthcare professionals. Vision Corner not only revitalizes a historic structure but also serves as a catalyst for community growth and educational excellence, symbolizing a new chapter of opportunity for Union City.



City of New Haven **TRAINFO Technology**

The collaboration between the City of New Haven and TRAINFO showcases New Haven's commitment to urban infrastructure innovation, particularly through the installation of a solar-powered message board on Landin Road, which enhances safety and mobility at rail crossings using cutting-edge technology. The TRAINFO signage system significantly reduces traffic congestion, with a 35% decrease in delay hours at rail crossings and improves safety by alerting motorists to incoming trains. It also provides real-time information to Emergency Responders, cutting response time delays by 90%. This initiative exemplifies forward-thinking urban planning for its impact on public safety and transportation infrastructure.



City of Elkhart **TOLSON COMMUNITY CENTER FOR EXCELLENCE**

The Tolson Community Center for Excellence in Elkhart serves as a dynamic space that fosters cultural engagement, social inclusion, and offers a wide array of programs for residents of all ages. The center, located in South Central Elkhart, aims to be a cornerstone for future economic investment in a marginalized area, providing a safe recreational hub, and connecting to neighboring communities and downtown.

In 2018, the Tolson Center faced closure, but strong public concern led to the formation of a task force that reimagined the center's future. By 2020, the Elkhart City Council approved \$5 million for capital improvements and committed

\$700,000 annually for ten years to support operations. The Community Foundation of Elkhart County and the Lilly Foundation also contributed significant funds.

Community conversations regarding the Tolson Center also prompted broader discussions regarding collective impact efforts to improve housing conditions, kindergarten readiness, literacy, safety, parenting efficacy, and economic development. Since its reopening in November 2023, the Tolson Center has seen remarkable success, with 3,600 members and growing, symbolizing a revitalized community hub that brings people together and enriches the lives of all who visit.



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GREEN PROJECT OF THE YEAR


The Green Project of the Year spotlights a program or project that has been implemented in the past year and demonstrates green programs, sustainable development, energy conservation, or environmentally conscious decisions.

City of Fort Wayne **Utilities Microgrid**

Led by Fort Wayne City Utilities, the city's innovative Microgrid Project addresses climate change, energy costs, and resilience by integrating renewable energy sources like solar and battery storage with natural gas generation to power critical water and wastewater facilities.

In response to Fort Wayne's Climate Action and Adaptation Plan, the city developed a strategy to reduce dependency on

traditional utilities and increase energy resiliency. By modeling over 25,000 scenarios and partnering with experts, Fort Wayne implemented a 5-megawatt solar array, additional natural gas-driven generation, and battery storage. This project secures the city's utilities against future energy cost increases while enhancing sustainability and service quality.



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
